Achieving excellence together

Ofsted - Good

Staff and students at Aldridge School are celebrating after inspectors gave us a glowing report, praising exam success and highlighting some outstanding teaching. The report released by Ofsted shows the school has jumped from a "Satisfactory" judgement two years ago, to "Good" in all of the four areas inspected.

We have been acknowledged as "Good" in the achievement of students, the quality of teaching, the behaviour and safety of students and leadership and management. The report said there has been a sharp increase in the proportion of students gaining five A* to C grades at GCSE including English and Maths. The proportion of students gaining the highest A* to A grades has also shown a significant improvement and standards are well above average.

Inspectors found that the teaching at the Aldridge School is "Good" and that some is "Outstanding". Ofsted said that teachers have good subject knowledge and give good advice to students on how to improve their work.

Student behaviour was appraised as "Good" and inspectors noted students behave well around school, as well as in lessons. "Students are polite and respectful and enjoy school and feel safe," says the report, which adds, "students' moral, social, spiritual and cultural understanding is good and they are provided with many musical and sporting opportunities." Leadership and Management came in for praise with inspectors noting, at all levels that Leadership and Management was driving the school forward with clear direction and purpose.

Mr Mountney, said we are all delighted with the inspectors' findings. "It is very reassuring to know Ofsted has clearly recognised the significant changes and improvements we have made over the past two years. Staff and students are very proud of their school and I am particularly pleased that inspectors described it as 'harmonious and orderly', where students feel safe and where they are able to make good progress."

Year 10 student Nikki Sehro, aged 15, said: "I love this school and I told the inspectors that I liked my lessons, especially Food Technology." Logan Pritchard, aged 12, who is in Year 8, added: "The effort that goes into this school is beyond comparison."

USA Internships

During the summer three Aldridge Students were given the opportunity to take part in an internship programme in the USA

Madeleine Turner was one of the students who took part in the exchange programme and had the chance to experience the business world of America. Madeleine spent two and a half weeks in Vermont, Boston and New York learning all about local and worldwide businesses and the American culture. Madeleine said "As part of the trip I stayed with host families, which added so much to the experience. I was welcomed into the homes of two families, and made numerous friends both from America and my fellow exchange partners from London. I could not have imagined a better way to spend my summer and am truly thankful for the opportunity."

American Embassy

Madeleine Turner chaired a lively discussion between Aldridge students and representatives of our partner school in Washington DC in response to U.S. Secretary of State Arne Duncan's statement on Striving for a Healthier Future Worldwide at the American Embassy on Wednesday 14th November.

WMST students in Washington are currently educated in a converted warehouse which limits their opportunities for the wide ranging sporting curriculum which is perhaps taken for granted by Aldridge students who came to realise their good fortune in this respect. Students shared their views on healthy eating and school meals and the pernicious invasion of fast food vending machines in many American schools. Students praised Michelle Obama's various initiatives to raise of childhood awareness obesity which is recognised as growing problem on both sides of the Atlantic. Both groups of students commented on the important role of school staff in raising awareness of a healthy lifestyle.

Oliver Parsons spoke about the wealth of House sporting activities at Aldridge and the enthusiasm of PE staff for extra curricular activities giving the opportunity for students to compete at local, county, national and international level. Oliver mentioned the support of the school's Gifted and Talented programme for aspiring sportsmen and women in addition to the academic life of the school.

Nicola Jones proposed the vote of thanks recognising the support of Wendy Parmley, CEO of Transcontinental School Innovation Alliance, who works with schools and the American Embassy to promote international educational opportunities. This is the fifth discussion in what is now an established annual event thanks to Mrs Parmley's energetic commitment to this project. Nicola also thanked Bruce Bradford from WMST and his students for making thoughtful and insightful contributions and Mike Prosser from the embassy. Mr Prosser is the new assistant cultural attaché and he hopes to visit Aldridge very soon to meet students and continue to promote the very firm cultural links our students already have with the United States through embassy staff.

On leaving the embassy for a brief look at the festive lights in Oxford Street students were thrilled to meet Boris Johnson who very kindly forgave the unexpected interruption to his very busy day and generously stopped for a few words and gave autographs. Oliver hopes his English teacher will forgive the unorthodox use of his exercise book but feels that meeting one of his heroes outweighs any reprimand. All agreed that Mr Johnson cycling to his next engagement was the epitome of striving for a healthier future and Arne Duncan would approve!

Paula Jones said: "In a relatively short space of time, students came up with some very inventive business proposals and all of them gave fantastic pitches, even Lord Sugar would have been impressed."

Lorenzo Cosco, from Walsall EBP, added: "They were incredibly enterprising and came up with creative ideas for new phone apps, food and hair products. This is a simple but great event because it really challenges young people to think about starting their own business at the same time as identifying their enterprise capabilities."
